Linda Brown Buck

Linda Brown Buck is a biologist. Biologists are scientists that find out about living things.

Linda was born in Washington, in America, in 1947. As a child, she lived with her father, mother and two sisters.

Linda's father was an engineer and in his spare time he liked to invent things. Her mother loved solving puzzles and word problems in her free time.

Linda's parents encouraged her and her sisters to learn and told them they could be whatever they wanted to be.



She enjoyed sewing clothes for her dolls and using tools to build things.

Linda worked hard at school and college, and she realised that she loved finding out more about living things.

She started working in science labs as a biologist.

Linda's most famous work was all about how we can smell things. She did lots of different experiments with different scents to see how people smelled them. She even observed rats to see how they reacted to different smells.

Linda was the first scientist to discover special things called odorant receptors in the nose.

Odorant receptors are the things that allow us to detect and identify different smells.

Linda's discovery was so important that she won the Nobel Prize for her work in 2004.

English - Lesson 1

How to Make a Papier Mâché Globe

Are you learning about the continents of the world? Read on to discover how to make a papier mâché globe of your own to help you to remember them.

You will need:

a round balloon

lots of strips of newspaper about 2cm wide

a bowl of water and flour mixture (one cup of flour and two cups of water)

an atlas

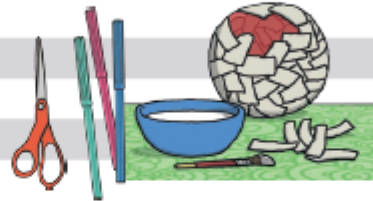
a continents of the world sheet

some blue paint and paintbrush

a pack of felt tip pens

a pair of scissors

some glue

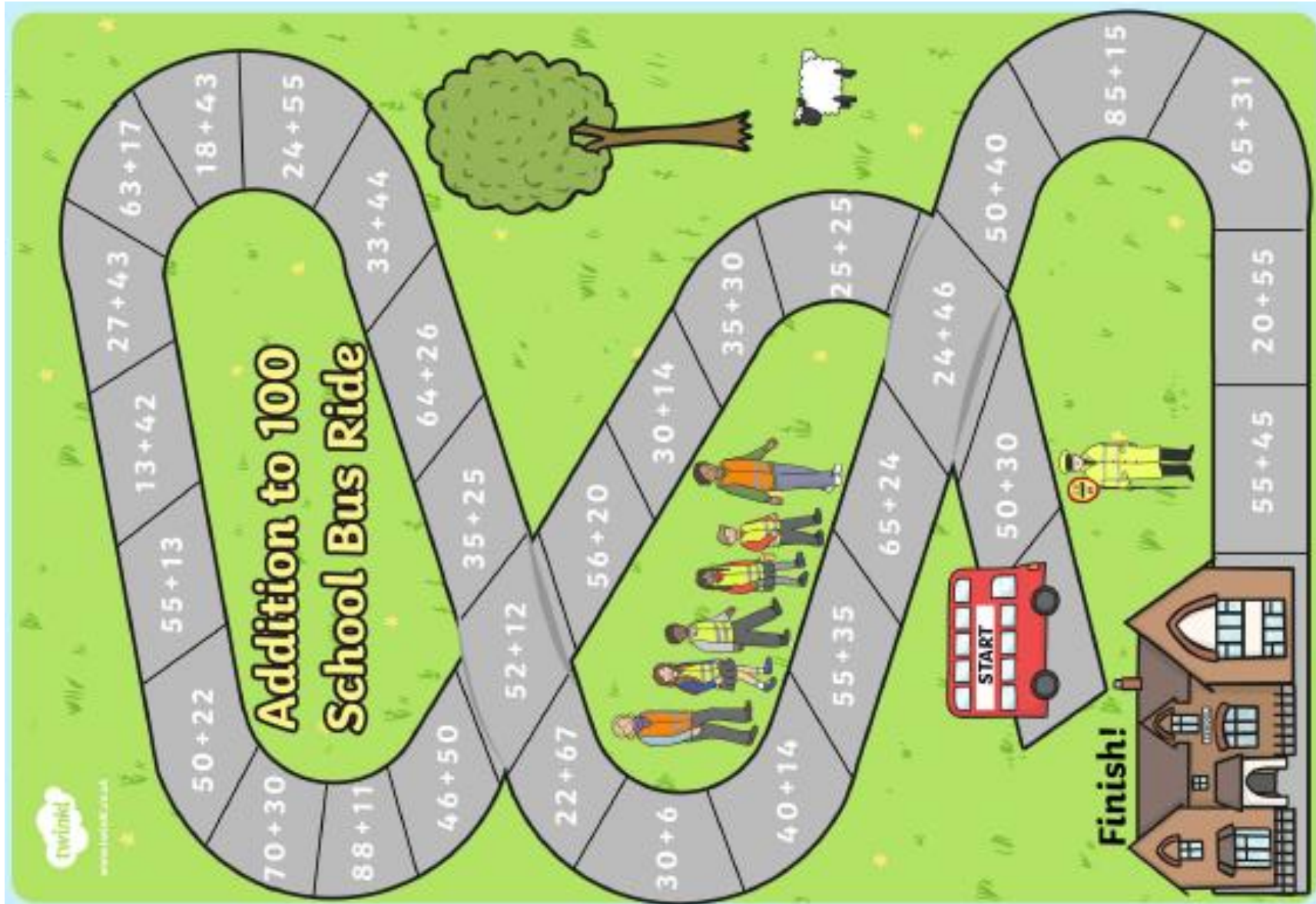


- First of all, blow up the balloon gently. Don't let it burst.
- Ask a grown-up to help you tie the balloon if it is tricky.
- Dip the strips of newspaper in the flour and water mix and slowly wrap the strips all around the balloon until it is covered.
- Cover the balloon at least three or four times.
- Leave the balloon to go solid. Place it in a warm, dry place.
- Next, paint the whole globe blue to show the water.
- Leave to dry.
- Colour in the seven continents neatly on the activity sheet.
- Cut out the continents but be careful with the scissors.
- Stick the continents in the right position on the globe. Use an atlas to help you if you are unsure.
- Label the oceans and carefully draw the line of the equator. Finally, label the continents of North America, South America, Africa, Antarctica, Australasia, Europe and Asia.
